## President's address

#### Welcome to OECI Oncology Days 2018

The annual convention of the Directors of the European Cancer Centres and Institutes is being hosted in Poland for the first time. This year is a major milestone event for the OECI as it is the celebration of the OECI's 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary since the very first meeting of the Directors of some of the main European Cancer Centres back in 1979.

First of all, I would like to thank the Greater Poland Cancer Centre for the kind and generous support given to our main Annual Event.

2018 is the transitional year of my presidential mandate and Professor Thierry Philip will be taking over the Chair of OECI, with the intention of carrying forward the running activities and leading our Organisation towards new challenges and achievements, promoting multidisciplinarity, integration and quality in the organisation of our cancer centres.

Again this year, we decided to leave space in our programme for all our Working Groups to also meet, in addition to the Directors of our centres/institutes, and other stakeholders working in different sectors, giving them the opportunity to draw upon results already obtained or to pursue further collaboration for the achievements of their goals.

The increase in survivorship has also reinforced the issue of patient rights to access a dignified and active life in society, during and post illness, on top of the best options for cure and therapeutic solutions. After my presidency, I will continue to Chair the WG on Collaboration for Good Practices with Patients and I will have more time to dedicate to the actions we are currently developing in order to strengthen our relationship with patients, demonstrating how they are at the centre of all our efforts.

It has been a great honour to serve as your President for the last four years. The OECI is a unique and essential organisation for the development and recognition of all the hard work done by all the professionals in our cancer centres.



#### **Director's foreword**

Our Institution uses the most advanced therapeutic methods in the fight against neoplastic diseases with the hope of restoring patients to health while fully respecting their dignity.

#### Description of the Centre and history

The Greater Poland Cancer Centre was established in 1953 and is one of the largest oncology centres in Poland and in Europe. The centre provides medical service in the field of oncological surgery, head and neck cancer surgery, radiotherapy, chemotherapy, gynaecological oncology, anaesthesiology, brachytherapy, and diagnostics. Over 20,000 patients are admitted to the hospital each year, and more than 6,000 surgical procedures and 6,500 radiotherapy treatments are performed annually.

#### Main research activities

The centre's primary research activity involves clinical studies, such as the high profile clinical trials Hypoprost and Cyberprost for prostate cancer and the HIOB trial for intraoperative breast radiotherapy. EORTC lines of investigation include the following: the origin of ovarian cancer; HPV infection in head and neck cancer; contributions to the cancer genome atlas; the physics-related and biological processes during radiotherapy; the effect of cytostatic agents and ionizing radiation on cancer cells; and molecular imaging in radiation therapy planning.

#### **Core facilities**

Following the European model, interdisciplinary teams provide a comprehensive care according to cancer localisation in the body. These multidisciplinary teams work closely together to treat patients with cancers in a given location, such as the breast, the upper digestive tract, or the head and neck area. These teams are mainly led by physicians from various specialisations (e.g., surgery, radiation oncology, medical oncology) in addition to psychologists, physical therapists, nurses, and other supporting personnel (e.g., social workers or dieticians).





#### Education

WCO has established a Teaching and Conference Centre, which aims to serve the needs health care personnel, patients, and medical students from the Poznan University of Medical Sciences as well as other universities. Additionally, a variety of training courses, scientific conferences, and symposia are organised each year for both Polish and foreign physicians and other health care professionals.

The Greater Poland Cancer Centre is also home to the editorial offices of four international scientific journals:

1) Reports of Practical Oncology and Radiotehrapy,

2) Letters in Oncology Science,

3) Contemporary Oncology and 4) Journal of Contemporary Brachytherapy.

### **OECI Pathology Day** Development of Clinical Cancer Research

June 20<sup>st</sup> IBB Andersia Hotel

There has been a recent development in oncology that has led to the application of clinical research methods directly to patients under treatment. This is a result of the fact that our knowledge of cancer biology and the sophisticated analytical methods used, go beyond the usual randomization process performed in clinical trials. Indeed, recent literature has shown that individual tumours, within a particular type of cancer, often exceed the most up-to-date molecular classification, and the limits between distinct cancer types. This has recently led to new approaches such as basket, umbrella and platform studies, and to the suggestion of N-1 trials, as already discussed in the meeting held in Brno last year.

A necessary prerequisite to this type of clinical studies is the possibility to exchange reproducible analysis results among institutions. The update of the OECI accreditation standards is strongly related to the need to guarantee reproducible investigations. For the above reasons it is mandatory to continue the already started process of standardization and guidelines definition on analytical methods to be adopted, taking also into consideration new molecular morphology approaches.

#### The 2018 Pathology Day Programme includes the following issues:

- 1. Introduction to clinical research in today's oncology.
- 2. New types of clinical studies (N-1 trials, basket, umbrella and platform studies).
- 3. Standardization of pre-analytical conditions of biological material as a prerequisite for reproducible molecular analysis.
- 4. New types of methods in molecular morphology: new developments of in-situ hybridization.
- 5. Rare cancers as an example of analytical methods to be adopted for a better approach to cancer diagnosis and care (EURACAN).

# Feasibility of a OECI collaborative study on cancer outcomes

Twentyfour OECI Member (from 14 EU countries) replied to the 75 questionnaires circulated in 2017 to explore the interest and feasibility to carryout outcomes studies. From this survey it emerged that breast (13 centres) and colorectal cancer (10 centres) were most frequently indicated as suitable for outcomes studies, possibly focussing on clinical outcomes commonly available through health, hospital registries, or using the information included in the A&D questionnaire.

The aim of the 2018 Cancer Outcomes research Meeting is:

- 1) to agree on a few easily collectable and meaningful outcomes indicators
- 2) to discuss how to practically conduct a pilot project

The Poznański Bazaar is one of the most important symbols of Poznań and Wielkopolska. It was established in 1838 thanks to the initiative of Karol Marcinkowski and the company established by him, whose aim was to build a hotel for Polish clients and shops for Polish buyers. The bazaar quickly became the centre of Polish economic, political and cultural life. It was also the most important mainstay of Polishness in the Prussian partition.

The history of the Bazaar has always been intertwined with the history of Poland. In 1990, the Bazar Poznański company, existing continuously throughout the post-war period, took legal action and recovered the destroyed buildings of the Bazar Hotel. In 2005, the facade renovation from Aleja Marcinkowski was completed, restoring its rich neo-baroque appearance. After years of break, the company also returned to the culinary traditions opening the first restaurant, which because of the history of this place was called "Bazaar 1838". Bazar Poznański SA actively participates in cultural events in Poznań, supporting and promoting art. In cooperation with the Grand Theater Stanisław Moniuszko in Poznań initiated a series of concerts "Opera in the Poznań Bazaar", which regularly take place in the restored White Room.

## **OECI2018** ONCOLOGY DAYS Poznań not only for a congress

Poznań, one of the biggest and the oldest Polish cities is well-known for hosting international fairs and congresses on the grounds of Poznań International Fair. However, a trip to the capital city of the Wielkopolska region can also become a pretext to visit one of Poland's most interesting cities, inextricably linked to the very beginnings of Polish statehood. It was here that Duke Mieszko the First had chosen for his borough; it was also probably where he he was baptised in 966, thereby joining the ranks of medieval European rulers. This very event is thought to have been the beginning of Polish statehood. This story, as well as many more, are told at Porta Posnania - the state of the art multimedia heritage interpretation center, located in the Śródka district of Poznań. Ages ago it was a separate little town and Śródka has managed to preserve some of this small town charm and atmosphere to this very day. Nowadays, it has undergone a major gentrification and is home to many little restaurants and bars. One of the district's most noticeable attractions is the fairytale, 3-dimensional mural on the wall of one of its townhouses.

When visiting Poznań, it would be impossible to miss Stary Rynek (the Old Market Square) with its magnificent Renaissance Ratusz (Town Hall). On its tower, every day exactly at midday, Poznań's famous billy goats butt their heads a dozen times. The Old Market Square also hosts Poznań Croissant Museum in one of its townhouses directly opposite the Town Hall. You will not find any museum cabinets filled with exhibits - there are however live audience participation show-and-tells, where you can both taste and learn the secrets of the St Martin's Croissants, one of Poznań's most famous delicacies.

The Old Town is the beating heart of this city of half a million, with around 120 thousand students residing within its limits, including those from Europe and other continents. They are one of the reasons Poznań is alive and kicking almost day and night. Numerous bars, clubs and restaurants await the visitors at any time of the year.

The past and present interlock in Zamek Cultural Center, which is the former Imperial Castle. Castles are usually famous for their history dating back to the days of yore - but Poznań castle is unique. It is Europe's youngest castle built for a crowned ruler. It was built in 1910 for the German Emperor William the Second, and its history is just as complex as the entire 20th century. Today, it houses one of Poland's biggest cultural institutions, organizing hundreds of concerts, festivals, exhibitions and other events every year.

Another place where various worlds meet and mesh is Stary Browar - a shopping, arts and business center which is an adapted former 19th century brewery, hence its name. In 2005 it was awarded the title of Best Shopping Center in the World in the medium-sized commercial buildings category by the International Council of Shopping Centers.

The modern continuator of Poznań's beer traditions, dating back to the medieval times, is Lech Browary Wielkopolski. Lech is one of Poland's most beloved and popular beer brands. The Lech Brewery is also available for guided tours, which show the visitors all the stages of beer production and conclude with a beer tasting.

The center of Poznań is compact enough for on foot or cycle sightseeing - in fact, it offers nearly 90 city bike stations to choose from. This way you can visit Lake Malta, one of Europe's best and most picturesque professional regatta courses. For Poznań residents it is one of the most beloved places of active leisure, with an all-year-round ski slope and an impressive Aqua Park - Termy Maltańskie, with a few dozen saunas and many other water attractions.

These are only a selected few of the many attractions Poznań has to offer, and we haven't even touched upon Poznań's surrounding areas with the Castle in Kórnik, the meticulously renovated Palace in Rogalin, showing the everyday lives of the 1930s aristocracy, or Wielkopolski National Park with its unique postglacial landscapes.

### **Tourist attractions**

#### 1. The Cathedral Island and Porta Posnania

The Cathedral Island (Ostrów Tumski) is the oldest part of Poznań. This is the place where the first settlement was erected by the Piast dynasty in the 10<sup>th</sup> century. You can visit the oldest Polish cathedral. It is believed that the remains of the first Polish sovereigns, duke Mieszko I and king Bolesław Chrobry, are buried here.

Here you will also find the remarkable Porta Posnania or "Gate to Poznan". It attracts its visitors with a multimedia display, educational workshops, cultural events and tours. It presents the fascinating history of Cathderal Island. The Porta Posnania is a perfect starting point for exploring the city along the Royal-Imperial Route. More: www.portaposnania.eu.

#### 2. The Old Market Square - heart of the city

The Old Market Square and its surroundings are among the most interesting places to see in Poznań. The beautiful Renaissance town hall with its famous mechanical billy goats on a clock tower, the old houses, charming side streets, numerous museums, pubs, cafes and people walking the streets – all of this creates the unique atmosphere of the place. The Old Market Square is the heart of Poznań. From spring to autumn, surrounded by pavement cafes, the Square is bustling late into the night. #### 3. The youngest castle in Europe

This huge neo-Romanesque building, designed by Franz Schwechten, was constructed in the years 1905-1910 for German Emperor Wilhelm II. It means that it actually is the youngest castle in Europe which was built for a monarch. After WWI when Poland regained its independence, the Castle housed the faculty of mathematics of Poznań University, whose graduates broke the German Enigma code in the 1930's. During WWII all its interiors were redesigned in the style of the Third Reich under the supervision of Albert Speer. Nowadays this unique structure is a cultural centre and a monument or metaphor of the whole complicated 20th century. It is surrounded by the so called Imperial District, erected to express the greatness of Wilhelm's Germany. More: www.ckzamek.pl

#### 4. Old Brewery perfect for shopping

Stary Browar (Old Brewery) is a shopping, culture and business centre, located in the former Hugger Brewery Buildings from the 19<sup>th</sup> century. Unusual architecture enters into a dialogue with the site's industrial past, a multitude of nooks and crannies hide mementos from the beer brewing times: ceramic seals, interior design elements, plaques. Stary Browar holds numerous awards including Best Shopping Center in the World in the medium-sized commercial building's category (International Council of Shopping Centers 2005). #### 5. Poznań Croissant Museum and Experience

Poznań Croissant Museum and Experience is a vibrant centre cultivating Poznań's tradition and culture. Located in the very centre of the city it offers fantastic views of the City Hall Tower with its legendary mechanical fighting goats. This is the place to be for everyone who wants to know Poznań better and quickly become familiar with its symbols, especially the famous and one of the most recognizable symbols of the city, Saint Martin Croissant. #### 6. Lech Visitors Centre

A tour of the brewery is very different from your usual museum or movie trip. A lot happens here, and it is all happening in front of your very eyes. Owned by Kompania Piwowarska (Brewing Company), the Poznań brewery is one of the most state-of-the-art in Europe, and the brewers working here are highest class specialists.

Just as the brewery is one of Poznań's flagships, the Lech Visitors Centre tour guides are the showcases of the brewery. They are highly professional staff who, apart from an excellent knowledge of the brewery's history and topography, also know everything about the various stages of beer production. A visit to the pub and a beer tasting is the last stop of the tour of the brewery.

#### 7. Archaeological Museum (Górka Palace)

### General information about Poznań

#### 1. Transport

Poznań is situated at the crossroad of the largest European transportation routes, connecting Moscow with Berlin, Paris and Madrid and also Budapest and Prague with the Baltic coast and farther on with the Scandinavian Peninsula. Thanks to its excellent location, the city is easily accessible by plane, train or car.

#### By air

Main Poznań's international airport is the Henryk Wieniawski Poznań Ławica Airport (IATA code: POZ). The airport provides flight connections with multiple destinations, including important hubs in Copenhagen, Munich, Frankfurt Main and Warsaw. Besides regular connections with four European hubs, it also offers the services of low fare airlines other capital and major cities, like Madrid, Barcelona, London, Stockholm, Oslo, Dublin, Tel Aviv, Rome, Athens and more.

Poznań Ławica Airport works alongside some of the world's most well-known airlines: Lufthansa, LOT, SAS, Ryanair and Wizzair.

The airport is located mere 7 kilometers from the city center, in the vicinity of the route leading directly to the major points of interest and tourist attractions. The most convenient way to get to the city is to use the public transport (day bus no. 59/ the night line no. 242) or to take a taxi. The taxi ranks are situated outside, next to the arrival terminal. The average fare from the airport to the city centre amounts to  $\in$ 5-7, while the single bus ticket costs  $\in$ 1.10.

#### By train

Poznań is a major railway hub with trains arriving from all over Poland and abroad. The journey to Berlin, Warsaw or Wrocław takes from 2.5 to 3 hours. All trains stop at the centrally-located Poznań Główny main station, from where it is easy to reach every district of the city.

The most frequent, daily connections include:

- · Berlin to Poznań approximately 4 direct connections,
- Frankfurt connection from Frankfurt to Poznań (transfer in Berlin),
- · Cracow to Poznań approximately 9 direct connections,
- Warsaw to Poznań approximately 16 direct connections.

#### By car

Poznań lies half way between Warsaw and Berlin. It can be reached by the A2 (E30) motorway from Warsaw (310 km) within 3 hours. The E30 motorway takes drivers directly to Amsterdam and in Germany (12 Autobahn) to Berlin, which is only 2 hours 40 minutes from Poznań (270 km). The city can be accessed as well from domestic roads - the 92 (east-west) and the 11 (north-south).

#### 2. The City

With its 550.000 inhabitants, Poznań is one of Poland's largest cities. Located in the West of the country, it is an important historic, economic, cultural and academic centre. More than 130 thousand students make the city teem with life. Poznań is well-known for hosting international fairs and congresses on the grounds of Poznań International Fair. However, this is also a place where over 1.000 years ago the Polish

State emerged. The most visited tourist attractions include the Cathedral Island (the oldest part of the city, dating back to the 10<sup>th</sup> century), The Old Market Square with 16th-century Renaissance Town Hall, former Imperial Castle (the youngest castle in Europe built for a monarch in the years 1905-1910), Old Brewery, awarded the title of the Best Shopping Center in the world in 2005 and Poznań Croissant Museum and Experience, where secrets of the local delicacy, Saint Martin Croissant are revealed.

#### 3. Climate and weather

Poznan lies in the temperate zone characterized by significant temperature variations. Winters are generally wet with temperatures falling below zero, while summers tend to be warm. The hottest months are July and August (when temperatures exceed 25C).

#### 4. Currency

Poland 's legal tender is the Polish zloty (PLN), which is divided into 100 groszy.  $\in 1 = ca$ . PLN 4,16 (NBP rate as of 08.01.2018).

The currency may be converted at exchange points, in banks and hotels. The majority of shops and restaurants accept credit cards. The most popular are VISA, MasterCard and Maestro. American Express and Diners may not be accepted. It is common to use contactless credit cards. Traveller's cheques are not accepted.

#### 5. Health & Emergency

In the case of an emergency, mobile phone users should dial 112 to be forwarded to the police, fire department or ER. From a landline or public phone dial the following: Ambulance: 999; Fire: 998; Police: 997.





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
